CLIMB EVERY MOUNTAIN Untersberg nr. Salzburg

In May, I had the incredible opportunity of travelling to Austria with Esther. We stayed with a good friend, Val, who lives in Salzburg. We loved seeing the city, taking the cable car up the Untersberg, eating schnitzel with noodles, and appreciating a slightly different culture. The highlight, though, was the Sound of Music Tour!

I love the movie, as does Esther -and seeing some of the film locations was a memory we'll cherish forever.

We discovered that most Austrians have never seen the film. When it was made, 60 years ago, memories of World War Two were still raw; and the film was never dubbed into German, so it's inaccessible for many. Therefore, what do the people of Salzburg make of these tourists singing as they cycle?

On the day of Pentecost (which we read about it in Acts 2), the folks of Jerusalem wondered what was happening as folks sang and praised God - in a myriad of languages. One of Jesus' friends, Peter, stood up to speak and addressed the huge crowd in that city. He told them about Jesus, whom many would have seen crucified just 7 weeks before. He called on those listening to recognise who Jesus was, the part they had played in his death, and the new life He was offering. The message would have been raw ... but it WAS dubbed into their mother tongue and over 3000 people decided to follow Jesus that day!

Did all these folks respond because Peter made the message more palatable .. by watering it down or by saying folks could "pick and choose" the bits they wanted? Hardly!

Peter said, "Repent and be baptised, every one of you, in the name of Jesus Christ for the forgiveness of your sins. And you will receive the gift of the Holy Spirit. The promise is for you and your children and for all who are far off—for all whom the Lord our God will call."

A challenging message but, also, what an incredible offer: forgiveness, new life, the Holy Spirit of God for you ... and your children!

You might be reading and wondering, "Why should I bother with Church? What could the Church do for me? Why would I ever have need of the Church?" The forgiveness, new life and promise of God's Spirit wasn't just for the day of Pentecost - it's for you, this summer, in 2025. And it can only be found in Jesus!



Friendships are made; we fundraise for projects and charities; find out about subjects from 'beekeeping' to travelling 'the world' – we look at a large variety of topics.







The following people have been appointed by the two Kirk Sessions to serve on the Steering Group:

Andy Waugh (CPC) & Rhona Wyper (MOCPC)



At the time of writing, there have been 4 meetings of the Steering Group, each facilitated by the Rev. Stuart Matthews (Maryhill Ruchill), and attended by the folks noted above plus the Revs. Laura Digan (Interim Moderator of Campsie) and Julie Moody (Minister of MOC on unrestricted tenure) Two further meetings will be held in August.

This Group is tasked with creating a **Basis of Union document**. That document essentially outlines: the name of the united congregation, which building will be designated as the Principal Place of worship and the fact that Julie has agreed to take on this change to her post.

It is hoped, DV (God willing), that the Basis of Union can be presented to the Kirk Sessions in September, and that the congregations, having been given due notice, can then vote at the <u>beginning of October</u>. Both congregations have a vote as to whether, or not, they accept the Basis of Union. The congregation at Campsie also get to vote on accepting Julie as the "sitting minister".

The results of these votes are reported to Presbytery and, if the Basis of Union has been accepted, then Presbytery would forward the relevant papers to the national committees overseeing the implementation of Unions.

It may well be that we could have a **Service of Union** by the <u>end of November</u>, and thus start Advent as a newly joined congregation.

The Presbytery of Glasgow is clear that only one of the buildings can be the "principal place of worship", i.e. the venue for gathered worship on a Sunday morning. The other building will be used for a variety of outreach, nurture and social events, plus occasional worship services.

There will be a **new name** for the newly formed, newly united parish. Hopefully there will be more news about that in the next few months.

PLEASE BE PRAYING FOR THOSE ON THE STEERING GROUP. They have been entrusted with this task by the Kirk Sessions. It is a huge undertaking, and we need them to be visionary, strategic, mission minded and with a heart for fresh opportunities to share the good news of Jesus in both villages.

- Time is always against us so we look for the quickest solution, the instant result, we run to the shop now or buy online with next day delivery.

But

 we will take our car to the garage because it is a big expensive item and it's a hassle to buy a new one i.e. lots of paperwork to sort out and time to wait

So, is it a combination of perception, skill and time? Is there really an endless resource of materials to keep making new stuff? The simple answer is no. The solution to changing our ways is complicated.

Psalm 60:2 - Good News Translation You have made the land tremble, and you have cut it open; now heal its wounds, because it is falling apart.

The act of mending things is a resistance against the culture of fast-moving consumerism. The act of repairing can be a mindful, it can be a contemplative time to think about the resources used to make the item, the materials, the people,

the transport. A time to reflect on what God has given us and how we use it

God asks us to act with integrity, to act with urgency. To put the time into our actions. To think in the whole picture, rather than the immediate. To understand that learning the skill saves more than just our personal time, it's an act of

service to God

There is a global rise in the number of repair café's offering to repair items, to teach people repair skills and provide lending libraries for tools. The people with the skills are out there and volunteering their time to make such an important change to our lifestyle. Please do look online to find the closest in our area

Repairing any item can bring a boost of joy into your day. The feelings of satisfaction when a broken item becomes functional again is uplifting. Gratitude goes to God for




