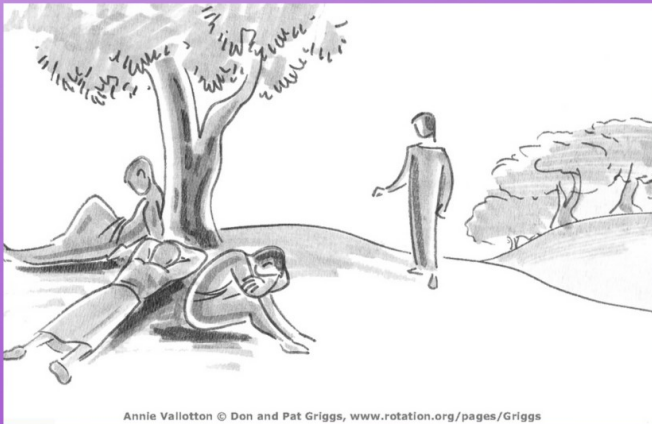

GLANCE FROM THE MANSE

Do you ever struggle to sleep? Maybe you're in a stage of life where there are very young children who keep you up, or someone in your family needs care during the night. Maybe your brain is over-stimulated. Perhaps you've had too much caffeine, too much blue-screen, too much food late at night... the list is endless.

Often, when we struggle to sleep at night, we can then find it hard to stay awake when we should be concentrating! I'm sure I'm not the only one to have dozed off during a movie or at a conference!

On the night before His death, Jesus had told His friends what was going to happen to Him. He'd told them that they'd all let Him down. The disciples had, of course, denied that they'd do such a thing. Yet, later that same evening, with tummies full from the Passover meal, feet freshly washed by Jesus, and His words crashing around in their minds, the disciples found themselves simply falling asleep at the very point Jesus needed them to be watching and praying.

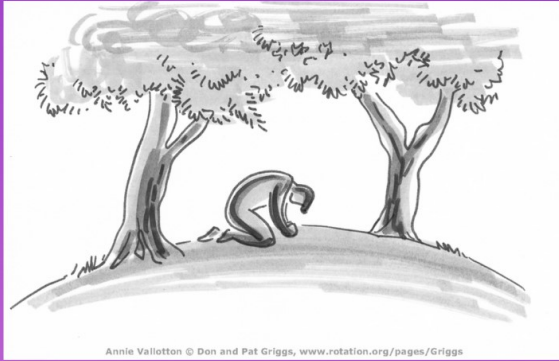

They slept - and even when Jesus asked them a second and third time to keep watch whilst He prayed, still they couldn't keep their eyes open.

Can you imagine how they felt when they did rouse - to the sound of soldiers arriving and Jesus arrest?

As they'd been sleeping, Jesus had been praying the most agonising of prayers.

Neil MacQueen writes: Jesus' struggle in Gethsemane is the defining moment of His life, and perhaps in all of scripture. Everything before has led to this moment, and everything yet to come is possible only because of His decision in the dark of night.

“The defining moment” - and Jesus' closest friends were sleeping?? How could they have been so thoughtless, so insensitive, so distracted ... so human?! They simply couldn't have known the horror of what was about to happen - even though Jesus had warned them.

We DO know what happened after Jesus had prayed that agonised prayer. He was arrested, tried, condemned, crucified. He went through all of that because He loves us, and He was making a way for us to be free from the terror of death. He endured the horror of Good Friday so that we might be able to call God OUR “Abba”, our Father. The thing that is good about that Friday is that forgiveness became a reality for each of us - bought at huge cost.

Will you sleep and doze as Easter is celebrated this year? I hope not. Of course, I want you to be able to sleep well, and to be restored for what each day holds; but I'm asking - is your heart alert, your mind awake, your senses fired up by all that Easter means? Don't sleep through that!

TOWARDS UNION...

The following people have been appointed by the two Kirk Sessions to serve on the Steering Group: Margaret Burton (MOCPC), George Kelly (CPC), Sue Mitchell (CPC), Gillian Murphy (MOCPC), Robert Scott (MOCPC), Margaret Tindall (CPC), Andy Waugh (CPC) & Rhona Wyper (MOCPC)



Meetings of the Steering Group will be facilitated by the Rev. Stuart Matthews (Maryhill Ruchill), and attended by the Revs. Laura Digan (Interim Moderator of Campsie) and Julie Moody (Minister of MOC on unrestricted tenure).

There will be six meetings, starting from Monday 28th April, basically every 3 weeks with a pause over the summer when joint services will be held (see below).

This Group is tasked with creating a **Basis of Union document**.

It is hoped, DV (God willing), that the Basis of Union can be presented to the Kirk Sessions in September, and that the congregations, having been given due notice, can then vote at the beginning of October. Both congregations have a vote as to whether, or not, they accept the Basis of Union. The congregation at Campsie also get to vote on accepting Julie as the "sitting minister".

The results of these votes are reported to Presbytery and, if the Basis of Union has been accepted, then Presbytery would forward the relevant papers to the national committees overseeing the implementation of Unions.

It may well be that we could have a **Service on Union** by the end of November, and thus start Advent as a newly joined congregation.

Please note: no decision has been made about which of the two church buildings will be used as the **"principal place of worship"**. The other building will be used for a variety of outreach, nurture and worship events. It is hoped that various viability studies, costings, usage surveys, etc. will be carried out over the next few months. These will help inform the decision.

There will be a **new name** for the newly formed, newly united parish. Hopefully there will be more news about that in the next few months.

PLEASE BE PRAYING FOR THOSE ON THE STEERING GROUP. This is a huge task and we need them to be visionary, strategic, mission minded and with a heart for fresh opportunities to share the good news of Jesus in both villages.

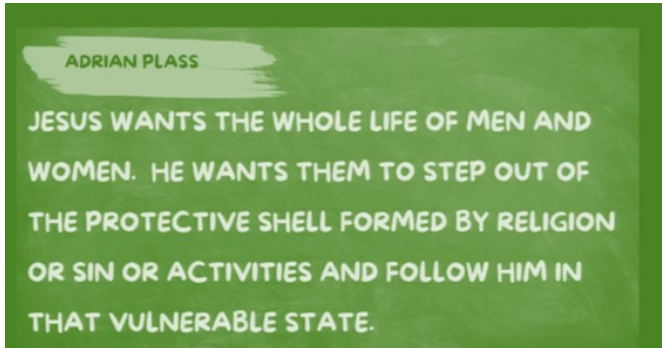

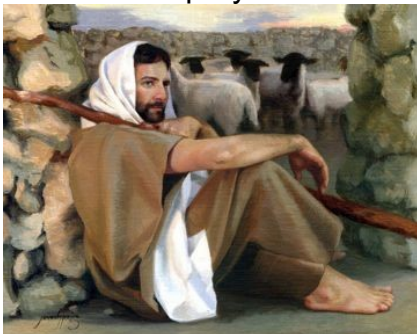

What a privilege to be able to lead worship every month in the 4 care homes within the village! On the 3rd Sunday of every month, we venture into Birdston North, Birdston South, Kintyre and Lillyburn.

The staff are very accommodating and make sure that those residents who wish to attend worship are gathered and waiting. We sing a few hymns and old choruses, hear a familiar passage from the Bible, are led in prayer and say the Lord's Prayer together.

These times of worshipping together are marked by laughter, conversation and joy. They are truly ecumenical and well supported.



The Hidden Costs

I recently learned something which took me by surprise, and not in a good way. I could not believe I had never thought of it before now. I felt like I had allowed my thinking to be directed by what others wanted me to think, and I had forgotten that I have the ability to question and investigate, to make up my own mind. I also felt cheated by the big tech companies for facilitating me to create a habit that is very hard to now break.

What I am talking about is the hidden costs to the planet from using our mobile phones. Every time we scroll through the news, or Facebook messages or look something up on google our request heads to a large server centre to retrieve the information and be returned back to our phone. In one sense its incredible how instantly this happens but I didn't realise the valuable resources being used.

These large server centres use a lot of energy and create a lot of heat as they search and send us our information, so a lot of water is used to try to cool them down. Water is a finite resource in this world.

The use of energy, the generated heat entering the atmosphere and the volume of water required to cool the servers are all hidden resources that the big tech companies are not actively telling us about. In previous years we were told not to print things out, to keep things electronic as it would be better for the environment, but now we're learning that it's not quite the environmentally friendly option that we were once told.

The Bible tells us this, from Ephesians 4: 14 - 15 (The Message)
Wake up from your sleep. Climb out of your coffins. Christ will show you the light!

So watch your step. Use your head. Make the most of every chance you get. These are desperate times!

So next time you're on your phone or laptop scrolling through the news or online shopping, ask yourself the question 'Is there purpose in my actions or am I doing this out of habit?' Is your

scrolling worth the hidden costs?

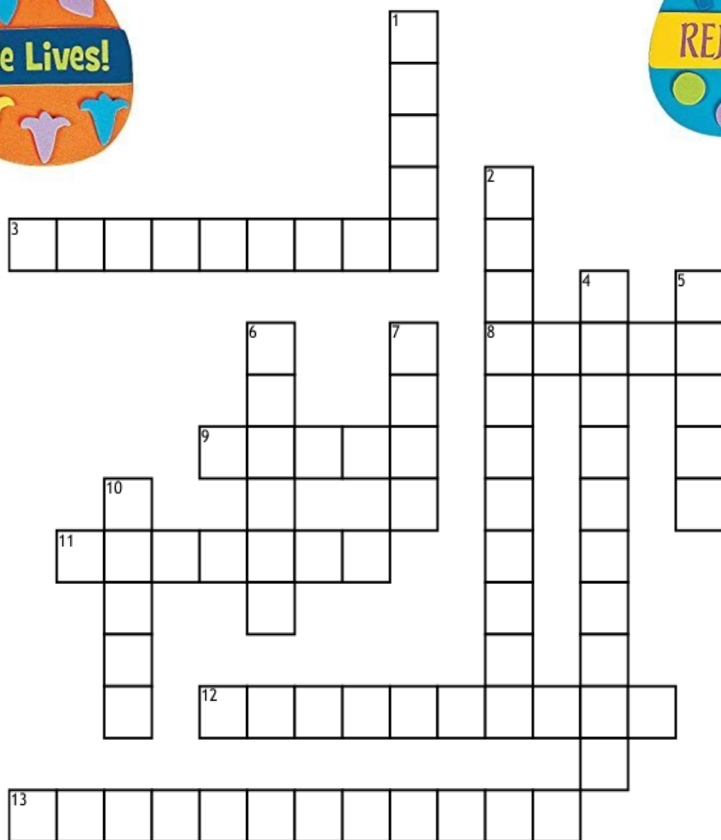

Fellowship



Our series of meetings for 2024/2025 have been interesting and enjoyable. In September two of our members entertained us, Andrew Mackenzie with his trips to America and Rev. Alastair McLachlan with a talk on the Scottish Geologist, Folklorist and Fossil hunter, Hugh Miller.

October brought us Craig Barry from the RNLI, who spoke about the 200 year history of the Lifeboat Institute. Later in the month, David Smith, a first aid trainer and the son of one of our members, gave us a timely refresher session on Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation (CPR) and the use of an Automated External Defibrillator (AED). The code to access the device on the wall outside the church complex, was given out twice recently by Scottish Ambulance. The AED is registered with the 'Circuit' who maintain a register nationally of all available registered devices. They inform us when the ambulance service have given out the code and the AED is taken off line. We then service the device and inform them that the device is again live and available for use by the community in an emergency. Our members wanted to know what the protocols are and how they should carry out the procedures if they ever needed to.

November brought Jill Scott and Bill Hicks, who spoke about their time as reporters for the Post on Sunday. They shared some funny and at times sad anecdotes and an insight into life of a reporter. Later that month, Alastair Dinsmore, the Curator of the police museum in Glasgow, gave a talk on the first one hundred years of policing in Glasgow.

The year was brought to a close with our annual Christmas Dinner at Hayston Golf Club.

On our first meeting of the New Year we welcomed Jim Slavin, who brought his collection of Communion coins and tokens and shared their history. Later in January 44 members and guests remembered Robert Burns with a Scottish Night, held at the Hayston Golf Club. There was traditional Scottish food, followed by

songs and poetry from members of the church, led by our Master of Ceremonies George Kirkpatrick.

In February it was great to join with the Guild to hear an inspiring talk from Bert and Gail Main, on the charity 'Mary's Meals'. At our second meeting in February another of our members, James Pert, gave us a great talk on The Forth & Clyde Canal.

At our final meeting of the year we welcomed Dr Hilary Wilson (introduced by Maureen Gardiner). Dr Wilson gave a very interesting talk on the Museum situated within the Glasgow Royal Infirmary.

Following our AGM in April we will be planning our programme for 2025/2026. Why not come along and share in our Fellowship, hear interesting speakers and chat over a cup of tea and a biscuit.
